Money management is about knowing where you are spending your money today and having a well thought out plan in place for where you want it to go. To be effective, you must:

- (1) Set Goals (2) Get Organized (3) Cut Spending Waste (4) Build a Budget (5) Save Money

There's that “B” word – Budget! Don't be intimidated or put off by the word; it's nothing more than a plan for what you want to do with your money. A well-designed budget should not be restrictive, but should allow you to make the most of every penny you earn and keep you on track with goal achievement. Everybody's budget is different, but there is one consistent rule: expenses should never exceed income! To be effective, you must:

- List and total your monthly income
- List and total your current monthly expenses (I keep a tracking spreadsheet)
- Subtract your current expenses from your current income
- Identify where you need to make budgetary changes
 - Options include increasing your income, decreasing your expenses or a combination of both
- Include savings goals – TSP, 401Ks, IRA – “pay yourself”
- Debt – pay off those credit cards/loans
 - Make realistic payments that you can commit to keep
 - Pay off as quickly as possible to avoid high interest rates
- Avoid budget busters
 - Keep to shopping lists
 - Avoid stores/malls where you have a hard time controlling spending
 - Charge only when you know you will repay the balance in full
 - Use debit cards
 - Question yourself if it is an “essential” or “non-essential” purchase
 - Reward your efforts with an occasional, but affordable, treat

DIVERSITY - September 2008

Diversity can be found in many different ways. I just read an article in a magazine on giving new hope to thousands of former gang members. It is called the Homeboy Industries Story.

Father Gregory Boyle, S.J., to give new hope to former gang members and to give them a new start in life, started the Homeboy Industries about two decades ago. The nonprofit business provides support services for thousands of people. The new complex of 21, 000 square foot is a bakery and café. It has created classrooms and jobs with learning opportunities for young men and women. The location is in downtown Los Angeles. Bruno and Alameda streets are neutral territory for the city's estimated 600 gangs. As many as 100 people enter the doors of this complex monthly.

The people are trained in a business and given unconditional love and experience. The Homeboy Industries provides the fostering of growth and services for the community.

The story is about Joseph Holguin who at age 10 was selling drugs and by 15 had been shot twice. After getting out of the state penitentiary he went into the Homeboy program. Joseph said that Father Boyle showed us something we'd never known before, unconditional love. Joseph at 29 is a peer navigator; one of the four Homeboy leaders trained in Los Angeles county Sheriff's Department to help gang members form connections with each other.

The Homeboys foster the feeding of the body and the mind. This is a change of life for the gang members. The Homegirl Café has 86 seats. This is where the girls work - in the demonstration kitchen. The fresh bakery aroma permeates the air. The girls find a home at the Homegirl Café. They have opportunities to work in the Café servicing breakfast and lunch. They have a demonstration Kitchen, making signature specialties such as Angela's Green Potion (mint spinach limeade) or tacos. The café, staffed with 28 Homegirls, has won awards on O Magazine and Los Angles Times. A separate kitchen supports the café.

The Homeboys sent 6 people to attend Los Angeles Trade-Technical College to become bakers where they even interned at another bakery. They oversee nine bakers and two pastry chefs. The bakery supplies local restaurants and upscale grocers. "We're also developing packaging to get the Homeboy brand into the supermarkets." The upstairs has a large computer center and an expanded mental health program. The labs have broadened the Homeboy's education components.

What a diverse industry! It would be great to take this concept to every large city in the U. S. It is so important to help children who are in gangs. This has provided job development offices where 300 clients each month hone their interview resume and job readiness skills. They also provide a free tattoo removal clinic where 250 clients participate monthly in removal process.

Hispanic Heritage Month 2008: Sept. 15 - Oct. 15

In September 1968, Congress authorized President Lyndon B. Johnson to proclaim National Hispanic Heritage Week, which was observed during the week that included Sept. 15 and Sept. 16. The observance was expanded in 1988 to a month long celebration (Sept. 15 – Oct. 15). America celebrates the culture and traditions of those who trace their roots to Spain, Mexico and the Spanish-speaking nations of Central America, South America and the Caribbean. Sept. 15 was chosen as the starting point for the celebration because it is the anniversary of independence of five Latin American countries: Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua. In addition, Mexico and Chile celebrate their independence days on Sept. 16 and Sept. 18, respectively.

Women's Equality Day, August 26, 2008

I was watching history unfold as Hillary Clinton was doing her speech on the 26th, and as she's talking, getting the crowd stirred up, she mentioned that that day was the 88th anniversary of women's right to vote - Women's Equality Day. I started to think, my mom was born nearly 2 years after we got the privilege of voting and it doesn't seem that long ago. Did you all miss the Women's Equality Day program at KSC? Did we have one last year and I missed that too? Now I really understand what has happened with our EO office and support to special emphasis groups like ours. If we don't do it, it's probably not going to get done.

If you missed the National Training Program this year, a resolution was presented that states in part

"...reports from members and employees in the FWP and EEO occupations and a recent FEW survey distributed to 28 departments and agencies resulted in less than a 7% return rate gives strong indication that the Federal Women's Program (FWP) is indeed moving into oblivion, the exact direction that early FEW organizers feared it would." FEW was directed by National President Sue Webster to develop, implement and carry out a Strategic Plan of Action to determine the status of the FWP in all major departments and agencies; reissue the recent Survey on Women and the FWP, study and publish the results. Starting in September 2008 a progress report is to be published in *FEW's News and Views* and on the website (few.org).

One of the speakers at the NTP indicated that perhaps since the FWP is no longer providing support for special programs that perhaps the local FEW organizations need to step in and make sure these events take place. I know some of our newer members in Orlando put on a program - hopefully they will share with us what they did. What do you think, should we let women's programs just drop off the radar or should our organization be proactive and give back to the women at KSC? Should we add a special speaker back into the ATP?

Women's Equality Day Program at the Veterans' Administration in Orlando, Florida

*An interview with Tracy Smith,
PhD., Psychologist-PTSD Program,*

Jean: Tracy, we understand you planned an event for Women's Equality Day on August 26, 2008. Could you tell us what you planned and carried out for your organization? Also I wanted to ask you if FWPM is a new job for you.

Tracy: Yes, this is a new job for us. Lynn Garcia, whom you met at the Awards ceremony, and I are working on this together. We are both FWP Co-Managers.

For Women's Equality Day on August 26 we had a mid day program so that employees could come during their breaks between 10:00 a.m. – 1:00 p.m. We used both sides of the auditorium. On one side we showed the film "Iron Jawed Angels." As you might know, this is a biographical picture on Women's Suffrage with a contemporary twist. It doesn't have a rating on it. It was picked up by HBO. It was made in 2004 for a Film Festival, and is now commonly shown for Women's History Month & Women's Equality Day around college campuses and high schools (history doesn't have to be boring). I would rate it PG13 for a few scenes with brief nudity in the prison. The film was very well received and everyone wanted to know where they could get a copy. Local video stores and the library should have it.

On the other side we had a display of educational material with interaction/entertainment booths with an FWP booth along with FEW materials. We were trying to get more members for Space Coast. The Winter Park NOW had a booth and literature that was especially related to the work place like the Family Medical Leave Act, Unequal Pay, and things of that nature. We invited a pharmaceutical representative who provided medications for Osteoporosis and also some refreshments. We also had free E-

Cards. We had a computer terminal set-up and actual electronic cards for Women's Equality Day. We had some technical difficulties but if people wanted to send them to other women just to say I'm thinking of you, they could do that to celebrate the struggle. In the middle we had a history display explaining what the event was all about. We encouraged people to walk around the booths and educate themselves and then take a quiz. They could win one of the NOW t-shirts with a Women's Equality Day theme graphic on it. We also had a realtor there who focused on women issues, especially after a divorce. She provided a lot of services by explaining what could happen in different situations. We had a smaller turnout because Tropical Storm Fay interfered with our publicity the week before but we had a steady flow all day. I think we will build upon the same activities next year but have more publicity, more food and maybe a few more vendors.

Jean: Is this open to the Public? Is it something that some of our FEW members could attend?

Tracy: Definitely yes! We even had some patients attend who seemed to enjoy it. Our auditorium is external and our vendors were from the outside. FEW could have a membership draw there and you are very welcome.

Jean: Thank you so much, Tracy. We are very impressed with what you are doing with the VA and want to congratulate you and Lynn on your success with this program.

You had mentioned in your e-mail that you provided disaster mental health counseling in our area after Fay. Could you tell us a little more about that?

Tracy: I was not really familiar with the area which made it a little difficult. I just want to say if there

are any other mental health counselors in the surrounding area please consider serving during the hurricane season. I had responded to an email from the Florida Psychology Association on a Friday evening, and had gotten a call from the Red Cross. I had expected to work future events because I wasn't in their system but I had worked on and off for 9 months with Hurricane Katrina recovery so I was familiar with what to expect. I ended up working in Rockledge the next Sunday because there was a need, so I just encourage your readership to volunteer (see link below).

FEW Friends, Change, like all things, starts with a dream, a vision, and an idea. The Southern Most HIV/AIDS Ride 5 is no different.

It was born out of a dream to make a real and significant difference in the lives of those infected, affected and at risk for HIV/AIDS. It was born out of a vision that 100% of what the participants raise could go to charity, a vision that the participants could maintain some control over the distribution of their funds, and that volunteers could do it all. It was born with an idea, as Margaret Mead once said, "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful committed citizens can change the world, indeed; it's the only thing that ever has."

With these three simple things, a dream, a vision, an idea, a small group of friends and acquaintances met and created what is now the SMART Ride. In its first year, more than 200 people joined in traveling more than 165 miles over two days from Miami to Key West.
